For care and treatment of non-urgent issues

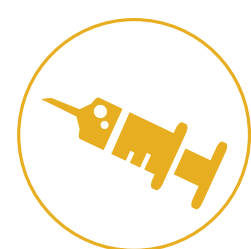

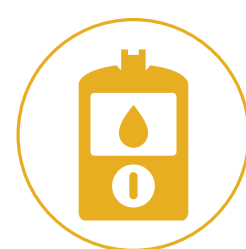

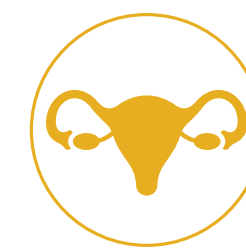

For immediate but not life-threatening needs

Urgent care can treat any health problem where you need to be seen quickly, but it is not an emergency. Urgent Care has evening and weekend hours when your primary care provider may not be available.

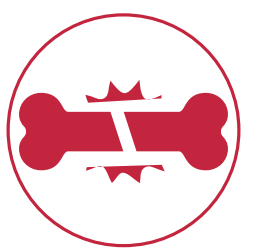
